- Line is a mark made by a moving point.

- A connection between points.
- An implied connection between points.





Figure 2.1 Lines.

# Line Characteristics


- Measure

- How thin or thick a line is.





- Longer lines have more energy




# Line Type


- Straight – Rectilinear
- Curved – Curvilinear
- Any combination of curved & straight

# Line Direction


- Line can go right or left, up or down.

# Line Orientation


- Horizontal = stable
- Vertical = stable / movement
- Diagonal = movement / conflict

# Implied Lines

- Broken lines visually connected together.
- Visual connection between lines.
- Closure = visual connection even when lines are implied.

## Line:

- It's an element of design.
